

Race car driver dead following accident at Cape Breton Dragway

One person is dead following an accident during competition at Cape Breton Dragway in Sydney.

The incident occurred on Sunday morning in what is believed to have been time trials for competition at the Washplant Road facility.

The Cape Breton Regional Police, Sydney Fire Department and Emergency Health Services were called to the scene.

According to a witness on scene, who didn't want to be named, the male driver allegedly lined up to begin the race. When the light turned green, the driver is believed to have remained at the start position for a few seconds before taking off and hitting the concrete barriers all the way down the dragstrip and eventually coming to a stop.

The speed the vehicle was travelling and the official cause of the accident could not be confirmed at publication time.

The driver, who was named as Brad Conrad in a statement by Cape Breton Dragway on its message board, was believed to have died on scene. However, the Cape Breton Post could not confirm that at press time. The driver is believed to be from the Pictou County area.

"On behalf of all racers across Atlantic Canada, we offer our deepest condolences on Brad's passing to all his family and friends," read the statement from Cape Breton Dragway on Monday night.

The Post contacted Gerard Bryden, board member for the Cape Breton Drag Racing Association, who said track officials will not be releasing any further comment on the incident at this time.

The Post also contacted Cape Breton Regional Police about the incident. However, it did not hear back at publication time.

The racing community from across Atlantic Canada took to social media to mourn the loss of the driver.

"Our sincere condolences to family and friends from Miramichi Dragway management and staff," wrote Marc Comeau on the Cape Breton Dragway Facebook page.

"Sending our deepest condolences from the Atlantic Pro Tree Series," wrote Mary Elizabeth Hicks on the post.

Meanwhile, the Atlantic Drag Racing Association (ADRA) also issued a statement on Facebook on Monday night.

"We have sad news to pass along," read the statement. "Longtime racer and crew chief for his father Brad Conrad suddenly passed away at Cape Breton Dragway on Sunday, Aug. 10. On behalf of the ADRA executive and our racers we pass our condolences to his parents Reg and Brenda."

The races at Cape Breton Dragway were cancelled on Sunday and are not expected to be rescheduled.

The competition was the third race weekend of the season at Cape Breton Dragway. The weekend also included the Big Rig Show and Go competition on Saturday. Bryden told the Post results from the weekend will not be released.

Racing is currently scheduled to resume at Cape Breton Dragway on Aug. 28-31 with National Hot Rod Association sanctioned races for Wally Awards expected to take place.

The Nova Scotia Independent Energy System Operator (NSIESO) applied to the Nova Scotia Energy Board on August 5, 2025, under s. 29 of the *More Access to Energy Act*, for approval of its proposed expenditure and revenue requirement for its initial test year ending March 31, 2026.

The application requests approval of the following:

- Its operational, maintenance and administrative (OM&A) expenses of \$6,751,287 as its proposed expenditure and revenue requirement for its initial test year ending March 31, 2026; and, after the application of Provincial funding, a net OM&A cost of \$5.3 million; and
- The NSIESO seeks to record any positive or negative variance between its forecast and actual net ongoing OM&A expenses during the period ending March 31, 2026, and any one-time transition costs that exceed the Provincial funding, in a Net OM&A Deferral and Variance Account.

The Board will consider this matter in a paper hearing process.

THE TOWN OF AMHERST has applied under s. 357 of the *Municipal Government Act* to change its mutual boundary with the **MUNICIPALITY OF THE COUNTY OF CUMBERLAND**. The Municipality has agreed and consents to the change. The reason for the change is to permit the property described below to be included within the Town, so that the property may be developed with Town services.

The area affected by the proposed change in the mutual boundary is described as follows:

The subject property comprises one lot known as PID 25038720, containing approximately 47 hectares owned by Shaw Rural Housing Limited. The property is located on the west side of Route 204 in the community of Brookdale and is currently bisected by the existing municipal boundary. The proposed municipal boundary change will result in the entire lot known as PID 25038720 becoming part of the Town of Amherst. 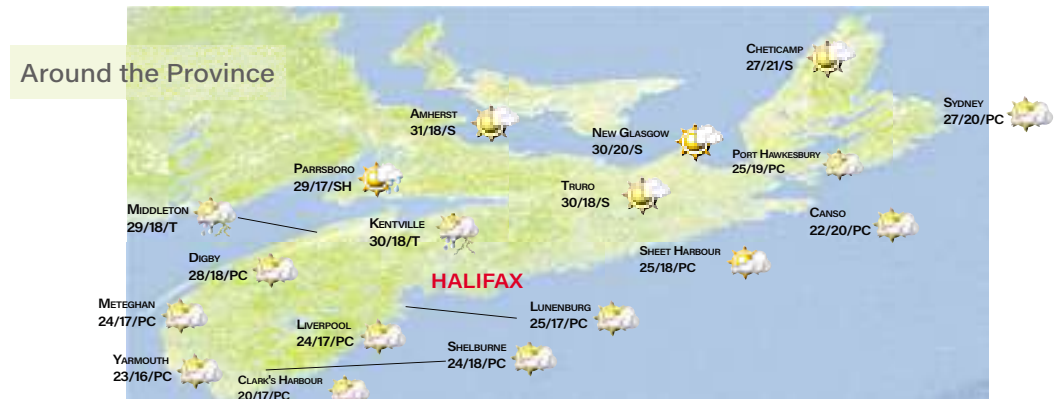

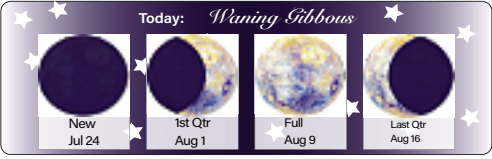

‘CANADA HAS LOST A GREAT CITIZEN’

Day remembered as distinguished business leader, Thatcher’s U.K. privatization czar

Prominent lawyer and corporate executive Sir J. Graham Day, who sold shoes to put himself through Dalhousie law school and became the last Canadian to receive knighthood by Queen Elizabeth II, died July 31 at Hants Community Hospital in Windsor. He was 92. A decorated business leader, Day’s long and varied career included leadership roles on both sides of the Atlantic.

He ran CP Rail and Hydro One in Ontario and was CEO of British Shipbuilders and the Rover Group. He was chairman of British Aerospace and multinational confectionary company Cadbury Schweppes, between its last two family chairs, Sir Adrian Cadbury and Sir Dominic Cadbury. Day oversaw the privatization of British Shipbuilders in the 1980s and went on to privatize Austin Rover in 1986, which was renamed The Rover Group and eventually Land Rover, which was repositioned as a luxury brand. He became known as U.K. Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher’s privatization czar.

“Canada has lost a great citizen and our communities in Kings-Hants have lost a tremendous resident,” Kings-Hants MP Kody Blois wrote in a Facebook post. “I had the privilege of meeting Graham and his wife Lady Ann, early in my time of becoming the MP in Kings-Hants. Graham and Ann were always generous with their time and welcoming.” Born in Halifax and raised in the north end, Day sold Hartt shoes at Simpson Sears in Halifax and supplemented his income with work on the CBC variety show Singalong Jubilee. In 1989, Day was knighted by Queen Elizabeth for his service to British industry.

He was recognized with both the Order of Nova Scotia and the Order of Canada and was inducted into the Canadian Business Hall of Fame in 2006. Day, who also served as chancellor of Dalhousie University from 1994 to 2001, eventually settled in Hantsport and remained active in his community. He continued mentoring young professionals late into his life and was a counsel at Stewart McKelvey law firm. “Graham enjoyed talking politics and public affairs in Nova Scotia, he was passionate about his beloved Hantsport, and I viewed him (as) a trusted sounding board,” Blois wrote in his

Facebook post. “Graham was also supportive of my wife Kimberly who is at Stewart McKelvey, where Graham served as counsel. Every time I was in Hantsport I would make a point of stopping by the house.” Day is survived by his wife of 67 years, Lady Ann, three children and three grandchildren. A funeral will be held Aug. 22 in Windsor.

Acadia, faculty reach tentative agreement

Acadia University and its faculty association have reached a tentative three-year agreement. If ratified, it would bring labour peace to the Wolfville campus to July 1, 2028. The Acadia University Faculty Association (AUFA) represents about 350 full- and part-time professors, librarians, archivists and instructors. The two sides have been negotiating for about three months. Jeff Hennessy, Acadia University president and vice-chancellor, extended his gratitude to the lead negotiators, Erin Beaudin (board team) and Anthony Pash (AUFA team), for their leadership, tireless efforts, and commitment to maintaining open lines of communication. “Maintaining an amicable, fair, and collaborative process was a top priority during this negotiation,” Hennessy said in an Aug. 14 news release from the university. “I am delighted to see these two groups have achieved this shared goal.” Ratification votes will occur in the coming weeks. No details about the contract have been released. The university did note the tentative agreement has improved overall processes and enhanced working conditions. The university’s release said it is the first time the sides have reached a tentative agreement without external intervention in “many years.” The union went on strike for four weeks in 2022 after the board of governors walked away from the bargaining table. The parties agreed to binding arbitration with the agreement running from July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2025.
